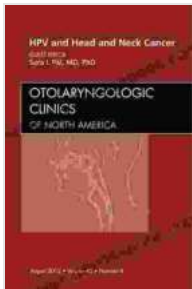


# Head and Neck Cutaneous Cancer: An Issue of Otolaryngologic Clinics of North America

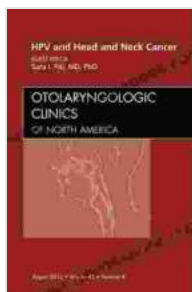
