

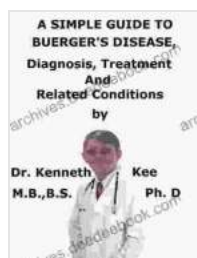
# Simple Guide to Buerger Disease Diagnosis, Treatment, and Related Conditions

As the condition progresses, the symptoms can become more severe and include:

\* Ulcers on the fingers and toes \* Gangrene (tissue death) \* Amputations \* Pain and stiffness in the joints

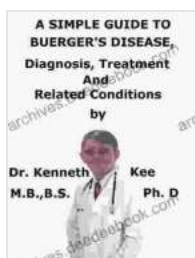

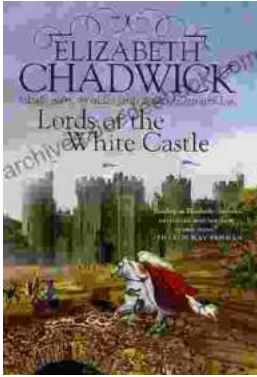


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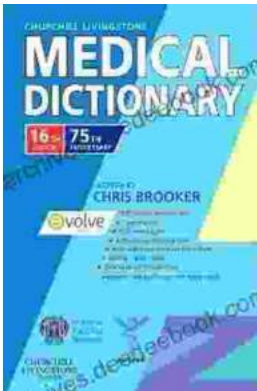
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
