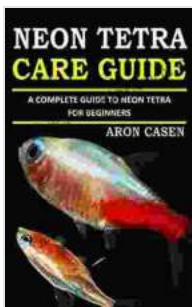

Choosing the Right Tank

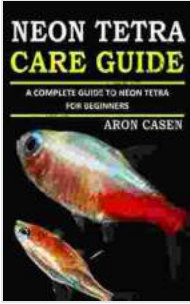

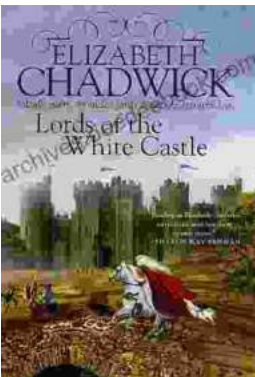

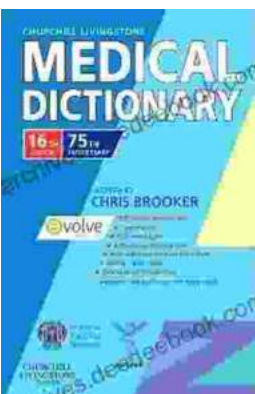
